In 2023, the Project Team helped to oversee NAIDOC Day, organised many events that were planned to develop stronger community and school relationships, held an Elders morning tea and a Family BBQ and participated in a Mission Trip to Western Australia to serve on a Children's Camp for Aboriginal children and youth.

In Term 4 construction started on the new Performing and Creative Arts Building. The building will consist of classrooms for Music, Visual Art and Drama classes. It will also have music practice rooms for individual and group music lessons. We eagerly await its completion in July 2024.

I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude to our Staff, our supportive parents and guardians, our hardworking students, and all our stakeholders for their unwavering commitment and support. 2023 at Pacific Coast Christian School (PCCS), has been a time of consolidation and progress. The consolidation has included a significant increase in enrolments across the School, with a sense of stability of service and high levels of Christian education being undertaken.

There has been a substantial improvement in Professional

Development through The Excellent Centre of the Pacific Group of Christian Schools. There has been an increase in service to the local community which has strengthened the culture of the School and there has been interest and engagement in reaching out to others on Mission trips. There has been significant interaction of PCCS with the other Schools in the Pacific Group of Christian Schools.

The major building project has seen the commencement of the Performing Arts Centre which is due for occupancy during Term 3, 2024. During this year, the company operating PCCS has changed from PCCS to Pacific Group of Christian Schools (PGoCS) with its ownership through Pacific Christian Education Limited (PCE). The School is at an exciting stage of its history and the staff have risen to the occasion in providing authentic Christian education. The links with the other Schools on the site being, Pacific Hope Christian School and Pacific Gulgangali Jarjums Christian School, have created a culturally diverse community which has been greatly received by the wider community.

My experience as being one of the 2023 School Captains is one I am extremely grateful for. It was an amazing opportunity. As School Captain, I got to work with the Principal, Mr Van Gelderen, and other staff members, as well as the Year 12 cohort and other members of the leadership team, to organise events with the intention of further bringing together our community. One thing I particularly loved helping with was the Chapels. Our Chaplain, Mr Gosper, assisted Reuben (the other School Captain), and I in running our own Chapel services. This was an incredible experience, as we got to connect with the students about Jesus, and it helped me grow in my own faith as well.

What stood out to me most in my experience as School Captain is the strength of the community at PCCS. The staff are all incredibly supportive, and I got to connect with the other students and build relationship with them- even the ones in the younger grades I had previously never spoken to. About our School

Pacific Coast is a transdenominational Christian School that has been in operation since 2008.

Our vision is to provide a Christian educational community as a centre of teaching, learning and serving excellence, founded on Biblically-based beliefs, values and behaviour.

We are committed to authentic Christianity, to excellence in education and to genuine community.

We pursue our vision from a Biblical base by aiming to be authentically Christian, to provide quality education and to practise Christian community that is rigorous, authentic and collaborative.

Seeking to transform the hearts and minds of its students through instruction in the Truth and the experience of gracious Christian care within the bounds of high expectations, the School prioritises stewardship of individual talent for the glory of God and in service of others.

Characteristics of our student body

In 2023, our school catered to students from Prep to Year 12. Located in Tweed Heads, NSW, our campus serves a diverse student community. Many students commute to school on buses, which travel as far north as Robina in QLD and as far south as Pottsville and Murwillumbah in Northern NSW.

The total enrolment for 2023 was 506 students, distributed as follows:

- Junior School: 194 students
- Middle School: 231 students
- Senior School: 81 students

The gender distribution across the school is approximately equal, with a balanced number of boys and girls. Our students represent 15 different cultural backgrounds.

About our Pacific Online Christian School

Pacific Online Christian School is a Campus of Pacific Coast Christian School that has started operations in 2023. Our vision is to provide a Christian educational community as a centre of teaching, learning and serving excellence, founded on Biblically based beliefs, values and behaviour.

We are committed to authentic Christianity, to excellence in education and to genuine community. We pursue our vision from a Biblical base by aiming to be authentically Christian, to provide quality education and to practise Christian community that is rigorous, authentic and collaborative.

Pacific Online Christian School is a Distance Education provider to students in NSW. We are fully registered and accredited to provide both the Record of School Achievement (RoSA) and the Higher School Certificate (HSC) with the New South Wales Education Standards Authority (NESA). We provide learning for students in years 7-11 in 2023 with the inclusion of year 12 in 2024.

Characteristics of our student body at Pacific Online Christian School

In 2023 we had a total enrolment of 75 students, with 7 students identifying as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander. We have students from rural, regional and metropolitan areas of NSW with many coming from coastal communities around greater Sydney and Newcastle areas.

Priority Areas for School Improvement at Pacific Online Christian School

In 2024, we aim to continue our pursuit of Teaching, Learning & Service Excellence, as well as the development of Christian Character within our community.

Analyse Qualitative and Quantitative Measures:

Grow students in wisdom and knowledge by encompassing student feedback, assessing performance, and developing approaches for diverse learners.

Develop Quality Teaching Programs:

Respond to curriculum reform by prioritising Christian perspectives and literacy in our teaching programs.

Our Initiatives Promoting Respect and Responsibility at Pacific Online Christian School

The introduction of our intentional wellbeing process using the Educator Impact Pulse app focusing on student well-being: Showing respect for students' emotional and mental health.

We have introduced our pastoral care program with a specific focus on broader Biblical themes in 2023 and 2024 This will grow to included digital discipleship in 2025.

Our learning design is planned with a level of flexible access, able to utilise recorded Direct Instruction for student-focused content: Respecting individual learning needs and preferences.

We engage relationally with our community through: Virtual parent meetings, family events, and on-campus experience days: Foster respect and responsibility through community engagement and collaboration.

Our team has been instrumental in the development of the rollout of the cidilabs learning resource across the Pacific Group of Christian Schools: Demonstrates respect for shared resources and collective improvement.

We intentionally plan for spaces, experiences and opportunities for parents to connect during experience days, encouraging respect and responsibility within the parent community.

We have established collaborative relationships through teaching agreements with other Christian schools: Promoting mutual respect and shared responsibility for learning.

We seek to minimise our environmental impact by stewarding resources well with minimal paper use: Demonstrates respect for environmental sustainability and responsible resource management.


Student outcomes in standardised national literacy and numeracy testing

NAPLAN Testing

Summary of data provided in Scout of the results at the school level reports 2023

Pacific Coast Christian School students received good results in the 2023 NAPLAN (National Assessment Program- Literacy and Numeracy). The school achieved results at the State average in most areas, though it was below average in a significant minority. NAPLAN provides a snapshot of student achievement in the key areas of literacy and numeracy and is used by the School along with other standardised testing, formative and summative assessment and teacher feedback to assist each student to develop key skills that they are able to use to honour and glorify God.

This shows that PCCS is achieving at a similar rate to schools with a similar student profile in all areas except Year 9 numeracy.

The school performed below the national average in most domains in Years 3, 5 and 7, but remained close to the national average in year 9 reading, writing and grammar.

The school also has the same percentage of students taking NAPLAN as the national average (95%).

The Year 3 cohort remained close to the achievement of similar schools in all areas. Year 3 results have become more stable in recent years, and there are no longer any areas that are 'below' or 'well below' similar schools.

The strongest domain is writing.

The Year 5 cohort remained close to the achievement of similar schools in all areas. Year 5 results have become more stable in recent years, and there are no longer any areas that are 'below' or 'well below' similar schools.

The strongest domain is spelling.

The Year 7 cohort remained close to the achievement of similar schools in all areas. Year 7 results are generally stable, but they have declined slightly in all areas except writing. There are no longer any areas that are 'below' or 'well below' similar schools. The strongest domain is writing.

The Year 9 cohort remained close to the achievement of similar schools in all areas except numeracy, which is below the achievement of similar school populations.

The strongest domain is reading.

Post-school destinations (secondary schools only)

The granting of Records of Student Achievement (RoSA)

Schools in NSW provide individual assessments for each student enrolled at the conclusion of Year 10. This information is retained by the NSW Educational Standards Authority (NESA) and is issued to students when they leave the secondary schooling system. At this point students will be eligible to apply for a Record of School Achievement (RoSA)

In Year 10, the RoSA grades are allocated by the school using school based assessments and aligning student performance with the Course Performance Descriptors. The School based assessment schedules are issued to students in a Year 10 Assessment Handbook.

On the completion of the Year 11 Preliminary Course, students will be given a Preliminary Course Grade. The grades allocated will be in line with the Preliminary Common Grade Scale and based on student performance in their School Assessment Program. The School based assessment schedules are made available to students in the Preliminary Assessment Handbook. Students who leave at the end of the Preliminary Course are entitled to apply for a Preliminary RoSA. Students who leave the School prior to the completion of the HSC will also be offered the opportunity to complete the Literacy and Numeracy tests offered by NESA. From 2020 a minimum literacy and numeracy standard must be achieved by students in order to receive a Higher School Certificate. Students will be provided with opportunities to meet these standards in the Year 9 NAPLAN testing and subsequent online literacy and numeracy testing.

Results of the Higher School Certificate (HSC (secondary schools only)

Congratulations goes to each of the 14 students of the 2023 cohort who completed their HSC at PCCS.

14 HSC courses were offered at Pacific Coast Christian School in 2022. This includes some courses delivered via Borderless Learning and the 6 courses delivered in the Compressed Model.

Our students also accessed 2 compressed courses and 2 extension courses through borderless partnerships.

Our goals last year were to:

- Increase the number of students who complete ATAR
- Increase the proportion of students achieving above 50
- Stretch the highest students into the band above 80.

We were pleased to achieve all these goals. However, the analysis of the bands shows that too many of our top students are achieving Band 4's in subjects where they were expected to achieve a band 5 or above. So, while we were pleased with the growth in this cohort, we are looking to establish this further with our 2024 cohort.

We also achieved our goals for E3s in each of the Extension 1 courses.

Our 2024 cohort will be the first group to have gone through without doing any compressed courses in HSC.

Our goal for the 2024 cohort:

- One student with an ATAR above 90.
- A greater number of students achieving above 60.
- Top students shouldn't be achieving band 4's in individual subjects.

Senior Secondary Outcomes (VET or equivalent) (secondary schools only)

In 2023 Pacific Coast Christian School offered Certificate II in Hospitality and Certificate II in Sport and Recreation. 75% of the Year 12 cohort participated in vocational training.

Description of how school manages student non-attendance

Pacific Coast adopts an attitude of close liaison with families in supervising students' attendance. Absences are noted and followed up both by phone call with the class teacher or if one week absence and by written correspondence. Long term unexplained absences are clarified with the Assistant Principal scheduling a meeting with the family to work with the family to organise Course Completion policy (available in full at the School) which requires, at the Principal's discretion, chronic non-attendance to result in the de-enrolment of the student and referral to the DET Home-School Liaison Officer for the area.

Retention of Year 10 to Year 12

There is a high value placed on education by families in the local area and within the Pacific Coast Christian School. As a consequence, there are high levels of student retention for all Schools in the area.

Required retention reports cover both raw numbers between Year 10 2021 and Year 12 2023 and actual individual student retention between these points.

- 34 students completed Year 10 at PCCS in 2021. 14 students completed Year 12 at PCCS in 2023. This produces an actual retention rate of 41%.

Theme 6: Our Community Satisfaction

In 2023 we collected data to explore the perceptions, attitudes and experiences of the School community. The results inform strategic decision-making as the school seeks to equip the School community for acts of service so they can make a difference in our world.

Parent satisfaction

A warm environment is cultivated at Pacific Coast Christian School, as parents believe the key strengths of the School include the nurturing environment, sense of community and Christcentred community. Parents also recognised that the School does extremely /very well at supporting their child(ren) to navigate emerging and innovative technologies. Parents also strongly/somewhat agree that the School is characterised by hard-working and committed staff and that a culture of respect exists at the School.

Student satisfaction

Feedback from the data collected stated that students are highly equipped in their creativity, digital literacy and in their holistic development. Almost nine in ten stakeholders who were surveyed strongly/somewhat agree that teachers at their School motivated students to learn and that student reports are informative and helpful. They also agree that the physical environment of their School is conducive to learning.

Teacher satisfaction

Teachers at the School have expressed great satisfaction in their roles and a strong commitment to supporting the community. This is evident in the low staff turnover at the end of 2023. They particularly appreciate the strong Christian community that the School provides.

Parent satisfaction

When we surveyed our parents a clear area of satisfaction was identified. The exceptional quality of staff and leadership was a common theme in feedback which builds into a positive school community. Parents expressed high regard for the dedication and leadership within the school community.




